Literacy fun on summer vacation!

Before going to bed they look through scrapbooks of previous vacations and reminisce about those of the past. They remember where they went, what they did, and what they saw. 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Preparing for vacation:

- Work together to make a list or plan for vacation. Research a vacation destination online or at the library. Your child can help read and write the answers to questions like these: Where should we go? What should we plan to see? What else would we like to do? When should we go? How will we get there? You can use the printable organizer below to help get started.
- Once you've decided where you'll go, it's time to make a list of what to pack! Encourage your child to write a list of what (s)he should bring along. Don't forget a camera!

During vacation:

- When you've reached your destination, or even along the way, take lots of pictures to remember the fun. Pick up a postcard or two, and don't forget to have your child write one to Grandma and Grandpa!

After vacation:

- After you return home, look through the pictures and postcards you've collected to decide which ones should go in a scrapbook. Have your child pick a few to write about. The captions can range from a few words, to a simple sentence, or even a paragraph. Use the attached scrapbook page or make your own. Make it memorable and have fun!



